The expert prosthetists in the POPS department at Shriners Hospitals for Children<sup>®</sup> – Tampa help keep Momo and other patients active by designing custom limbs and adjusting or replacing them as the children grow or develop new interests. They even create special limbs so kids can participate in sports. Recently, they created an attachment that allows Momo to maneuver her violin bow.

When Momo received her first swim arm, she was eager to get into the pool to try it out. Momo raised it high above her head to show it off. "She swam like a fish, fast and smooth," her mother said.
